PFA Committee Meeting

Held at the Old Ram Inn restaurant in Tivetshall St Mary on 2 March 2022

1. April trip. Richard explained that he had arranged a trip to the RAF Marham Heritage Centre and that members needed to let him know if they were coming. It would be on 6 April. Meet at 5.45 for 6:00 start. Paul has included some details in the latest Waypoint.

2. Fly-out destination. Richard is working on arranging for the club to have a fly-out to West Raynham where there would be a tour of the control tower. Date unknown.

3. Membership. Bob explained that there are currently 40 paid-up members.

4. Finances. Mik stated that there is £23,592 in the PFA bank accounts and £220 cash and cheque to pay in. John has yet to present purchase receipts totalling £1,256 for reimbursement to Mik. The biggest one being £1,224 for the defibrillator.

5. Share-a-Seat Day. This has been scheduled for 14 May.

6. Defibrillator/first aid box signs. Alan has shopped around and sourced custom-made, plastic-backed signs to be nailed up in prominent locations around the airfield. He'll be coming up to the airfield during the week to put them up with Bob.

7. Broken anemometer. The recent gales blew down the weather station pole, breaking the wind cups which were on top of the pole. Alan has obtained replacement cups and will be mending the weather station and using strong fastenings on the pole to prevent it being blown over in the future.

8. Liability insurance. The renewal date is not until 3 October but Steve and Sue kindly agreed to take on the job of looking for best prices and arranging the renewal when the time comes.

9. Next committee meeting. This would normally have been on 4 May (at the first of our summer barbecues) but John is away and it was decided to miss this date and hold the next meeting in June.

10. New concrete patio area. Bob explained that this would be best tackled when the weather turns warmer.

11. UL91. Whilst E5 unleaded petrol is still available from petrol stations, Bob has decided that he will continue to use his fuel bowser to provide Avgas.

12. AOB. Bob asked for it to be mentioned again that for hygiene reasons, members should not bring tea towels in the club's kitchen.

13. AOB 2. Bob pointed out that the new PIR light above the club hut door needed adjusting as it was remaining on. Mik agreed to have a look at its settings.

By way of self-introduction, Maurice writes, "In terms of my flying backstory, I'm afraid there is little to report, primarily due to the fact that I didn't start training until after the first lockdown in August 2020, I gained my NPPL M in October last year, despite the various Covid lockdowns, and my GST having been deferred three times due to weather. I did pass my first four theory exams in one sitting which was one advantage of lockdown two or three, swatting is easy when you're housebound.

"Trained in a C42 microlight and I continue to fly one, having bought into a syndicate while training. I am now awaiting delivery of a C42C which should arrive mid-June.

"Being retired, I now try to fly at least once a week to improve my skill set and I try to enter a new airfeild in my log book every couple of weeks. I guess I'm still in the honeymoon period and being able to pull a plane out of the hangar and fly simply gives me a buzz."



Nick Duckworth, our second newioiner has alwavs held an interest in flying and first aspired to be a Navv helicopter pilot. Seeing sense and joining the Army instead, he later attended Army pilot selectand ion pro-

gressed onto Chipmunks. Top Gun hit the cinemas the same week but it failed to provide the inspiration needed; not only could Nick not fly upside down, but he couldn't get the Chippy to land either.

If taking off wasn't pretty, landing was a precarious event, skimming over the roof of Middle Wallop Aviation Museum and bunny hopping down the runway until the aircraft trundled to a gentle halt much to the relief of the ill-tempered and frustrated instructor.

Flying took a back seat for a number of years until Nick discovered weight shift microlight flying and went on to gain his licence through the RAF at Wyton in the late 1990s. He then flew a 462 Q from Newton Peveril in Dorset; familiar destinations being Corfe Castle, Old Harry Rocks, Lulworth and Durdle Door. He later went solo on three-axis before leaving the services.

Now wishing to return to small aviation Nick is looking forward to getting back into the clouds, probably in a small single-seat weightshift but also with one eye on a three-axis replica from the early 1900's. Priory Farm embodies the same grass strip atmosphere as Newton Peveril and Nick looks forward to joining the community.
